KF-16 (c. 1976) was part of an "ethno-choreography" series created under the guidance of ethnomusicologist Ramazan Bogdani, professor emeritus at the University of Tirana's Folklore Institute. Bogdani's output includes 221 ethnographic film recordings totaling approximately 60,000 meters (nearly 200,000 feet) of 16mm film, running some 350 hours, described in a 746-page 3-volume catalog. It was extremely rare for anyone to have access to 16mm cameras in Albania under the regime of Enver Hoxha, but Hoxha believed in preserving Albanian folk culture and therefore sanctioned Bogdani's work. The dancers were filmed in the towns of Shënkoll (district of Lezhe) and Tropojë (near the Kosovo border).

15. Title: Joe Loss Orchestra performs

"If I Had a Hammer"

1965 clip of Joe Loss Orchestra and lead singer, Ross MacManus, performing the song "If I Had a Hammer". Ross MacManus was a successful English musician and trumpet player and his son, Elvis Costello, has reached even greater fame. In this clip, it's easy to see where Elvis inherited his style from.

16. Title: INSTANT GUIDE TO SYNANON

Format: 16mm - Sound UCLA Library

In 1958, the Synanon organization was founded by Charles Dederich, Sr. in Santa Monica as a peer-led detoxification therapy and attracted wealthy drug and alcohol abusers, eventually becoming a \$30 million nonprofit organization. Before they imploded following federal investigation, Synanon chapters sprang up in Connecticut, Detroit, and as far away as Germany. The informational film INSTANT GUIDE TO SYNANON (1973) was produced during a period in which the rapidly diversifying multi-million dollar organization needed to reassure supporters in the business community of its continued commitment to the treatment of addicts.

11. Title: Mannequins; Afri-Cola

Mannequins (1961, Hansjürgen Pohland): campy advertisement for a fashion house: models are posing in front of modernistic Berlin post-war architecture. "Afri Cola" (1969, Charles Wilp): advertisement for the "German Coca Cola": models (among others: Donna Summer!) are consuming 'Afri Cola' in a zeitgeisty and lustful way.

12. Title: Cyclopean Perception

Institution: Laboratory of Vision Research,

This thought-lost audiovisual supplement to Bela Julesz's landmark publication in perceptual science, "The Foundations of Cyclopean Perception" (University of Chicago Press, 1971), employs random dot kinematograms to demonstrate mapping of the brain's visual cortex. Created at Bell Laboratories in 1973 by Julesz and Enrico Chiarucci, and preserved by BB Optics.

13. Title: Home movie of Louis Comfort Tiffany

Institution: Milestone Film & Video

James Ryan was Louis C. Tiffany's chauffeur from August, 1911 until Tiffany's death in 1933. As a result of his long association with Tiffany, he was in a unique position to capture this 16mm home movie containing some images of Tiffany's later life in Florida. This (circa 1928) film offers a fascinating and intimate glimpse of Tiffany's life at "Comfort Lodge", his home in Miami Beach, which he shared with companion Sarah Hanley. It's the only know footage of the great artist/entrepreneur.

1. Title: Good Mornin' Blues
Format: Digital Betacam - Sound
Institution: Library of Congress

Meticulously restored by the Library of Congress from original film production elements held by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, GOOD MORNING BLUES is an entertaining and informative 1976 documentary about the rich tradition of Delta blues, hosted by one of its foremost practitioners, B.B. King.

2. Title: Harris H. Stilson Home Movie

Format: 16mm - Silent

Institution: Virginia Commonwealth University

The first two films from the Harris H. Stilson collection of Virginia Commonwealth University Libraries preserved through a grant from the National Film Preservation Foundation. Stilson (1868-1934) was a Richmond streetcar conductor, later a motorman, and amateur photographer and film documentarian. His films offer a rarely-seen visual record of Richmond 1929-31.

3. Title: FILM NO. 7
Format: 35mm – Silent

Institution: Anthology Film Archives

FILM NO. 7 (Color Study), 1952, by Harry Smith 35mm (blown-up from 16mm) Harry Smith's multi-layered abstract animation originally funded by a grant from the Guggenheim Foundation. This work coincides with Smith's relocation from California to New York where he would spend most of the rest of his life. Preserved by Anthology Film Archives in 2013 from the 16mm Kodachrome original at Cineric, Inc. Special thanks: Simon Lund.

4. Title: Claudia

Format: 16mm – Sound

Institution: Human Studies Film Archives,

Smithsonian Institution

Experimental film by Argentine-American filmmaker, Jorge Preloran, has four identical sequences of a five year old child playing, each, however, with a different musical score that changes the viewing experience. Preserved with a National Film Preservation Foundation Avant-Garde Master grant by Bill Brand, BB Optics.

5. Title: Sounds of Summer: Memphis Birthday Blues Fest

Format: Digital Betacam – Sound

Institution: WNET

The 1969 Memphis Blues Festival was held in June in conjunction with the celebration of 150th birthday of the city of Memphis. This clip feature Rufus Thomas performing "Walking the Dog" at the opening of the festival on June 6th.

6. Title: Slavko Vorkapich Home Movie

Format: 16mm – Silent

Institution: USC Hugh M.Hefner Moving Image Archive

A section of the recently preserved home movies of Slavko Vorkapich, whereby Vorky uses some of his well-known montage techniques on kids and family. May be offensive to those weary of awesomeness.

7. Title: Singapore Grand Prix 1966

Format: Digital Betacam – Sound Institution: National Library Board,

National Archives of Singapore

This footage is from Berita Singapura, a series of news magazine films produced by the Singapore Ministry of Culture in the 1960s. Narrated in English, Malay, Mandarin and Tamil languages as well as Chinese dialects such as Hokkien and Cantonese, the filmlets were usually screened at fortnightly intervals in cinemas before the movies of the day. Mobile film

units also brought them to the kampongs (rural areas) reaching out to an even wider audience. Comedy stylings of the eccentric vaudevillian duo, Al Shaw and Sam Lee.

8. Title: [Home movie-- Roy Acuff performance,

Dunbar Cave, etc.]

Format: 16mm – Silent

Institution: Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum

This 16mm Kodachrome home movie was partially shot in Richmond, Virginia in 1954 or 1955. It depicts Roy Acuff and his Smokey Mountain Boys, Little Jimmy Dickens, duo Johnny and Jack, and legendary pedal steel player Buddy Emmons.

9. Title: Alan Lomax Goes North

Institution: American Folklife Center, LOC

In commemoration of Alan Lomax's legendary 1938 song-collecting trip to Michigan, the American Folklife Center, Library of Congress, has produced an archival documentary film, "Alan Lomax Goes North", soon to be available through Youtube and on DVD. The AMIA screening presents several scenes from the film which comprises Lomax's silent 16mm Kodachrome footage edited together with his audio recordings of the same performers ("fake" synch) and narration of excerpts from his field notes.

10. Title: BLACK IS

Format: 16mm - Sound

Institution: Harvard Film Archive

BLACK IS (1965, Aldo Tambellini, USA) 5 min. B&W sound, 16mm Aldo Tambellini is an artist who has worked in a wide variety of formats. In the 1960s, he founded the Gate Theatre in NYC, the only public theatre at that time showing avant-garde and independent films daily. His work is inspired by "black," and in the 1960s he made a series of Black Films. BLACK IS, made entirely without the use of a camera, uses the sound of a heartbeat to create the rhythm for abstract forms made by painting, scratching, and otherwise manipulating the emulsion.
